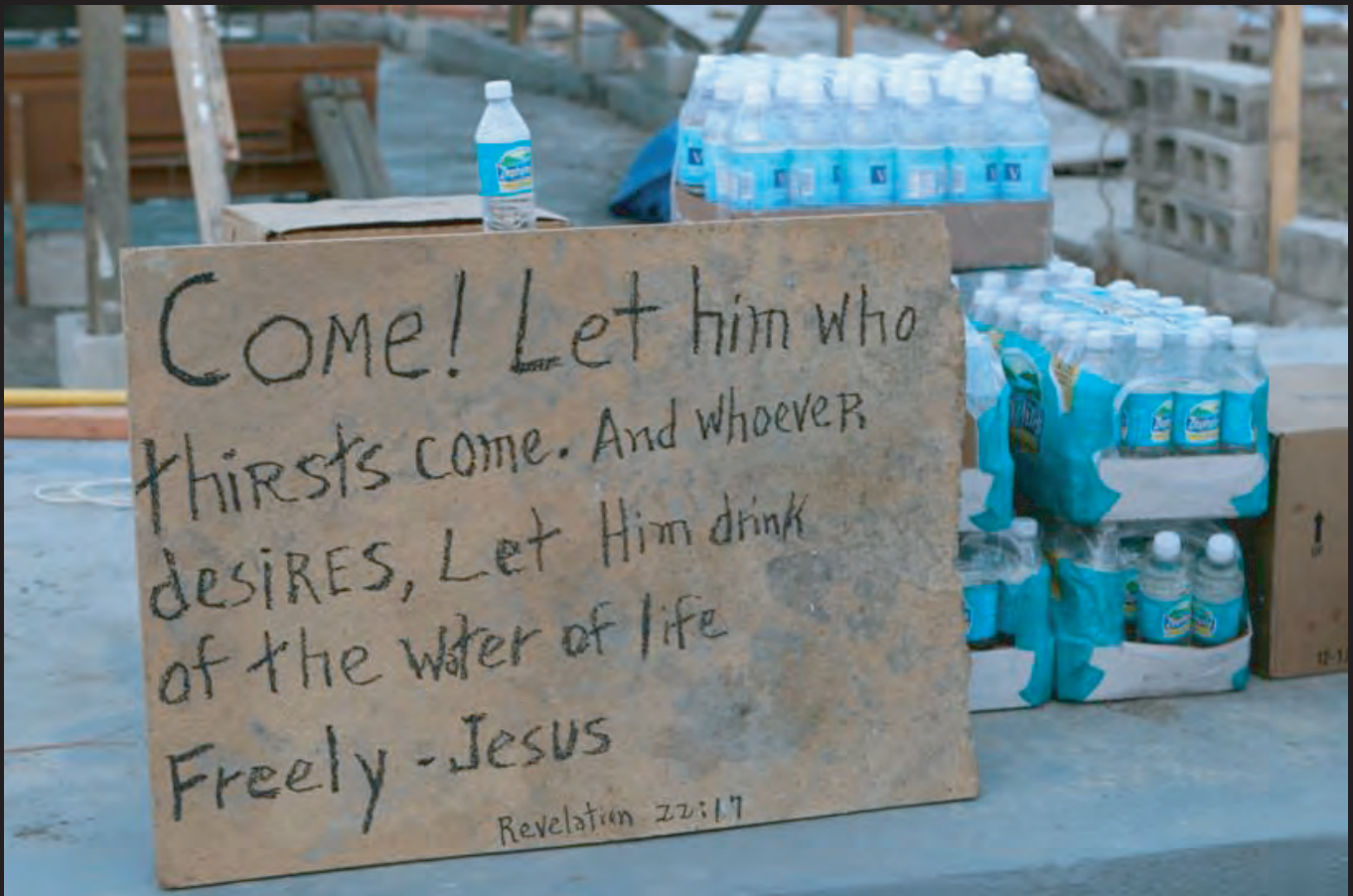

vision statement

The vision for KCCE missions ministry 2005-06 is to begin building a long-term ministry that the church can continue to build upon and shape even after all of us graduate - a ministry in which having a heart for missions and actively participating in God's work of missions is the norm. * Pray for the courage, boldness, love, wisdom, and spirit of the many Christians undergoing persecution. While religious freedom is protected by law, opposition to and persecution of minorities, especially Christians, has increased since the Bharatiya Janatha Party has come to power.

* Pray for growth and self-sustenance of the churches in India.

* Pray for GFA workers in India and for other future workers to go!

* More than 60 new believers were threatened with forced conversion to Hinduism or death. Praise the Lord for showing his mercy to these people but let's continue to pray and intercede on their behalf for growth and nourishment from the word and Spirit.

* North India Ganges plains and the greater cities in India are the least evangelized area in the country. Let's pray for the small percentage of Christians (less than 1%).

* Pray for lower-caste Indians who converted to Christianity have been stripped of their social and political rights for over 50 years now. Let's pray for more revival and even more perseverance.

* Pray for lawmakers of India – that God's hand would be upon them and grant them wisdom and concern for Christians and underprivileged people.

Answers to Objections to Going into Missions

-NOV2, 2005

When I spoke at Missions in the Main Hall Sunday night, I tried to give a biblical response to possible obstacles that are in the way for some people that may keep them from moving forward toward missions. My prayer is that God would use these responses to call more of you to go. Here are eight objections and a biblical response.

1. "I AM NOT SMART ENOUGH."

"Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe." (1 Corinthians 1:20-21)

"Consider your calling, brothers: not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise." (1 Corinthians 1:26-27)

2. "MY BODY AND MY PERSONALITY ARE NOT STRONG ENOUGH."

"But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us." (2 Corinthians 4:7)

"[Christ] said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Corinthians 12:9-10)

3. "I AM NOT A GOOD SPEAKER."

"Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and

not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power." (1 Corinthians 1:17)

"Moses said to the Lord, 'Oh, my Lord, I am not eloquent, either in the past or since you have spoken to your servant, but I am slow of speech and of tongue.' Then the Lord said to him, 'Who has made man's mouth? Who makes him mute, or deaf, or seeing, or blind? Is it not I, the Lord? Now therefore go, and I will be with your mouth and teach you what you shall speak.'" (Exodus 4:10-12)

4. "I AM AFRAID OF THE HORRORS I READ ABOUT IN THE NEWSPAPERS."

"Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world. And after you have suffered a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore (katartisei—"mend" or "repair" your horribly disfigured body when the lions in the coliseum are through with you), confirm, strengthen, and establish you." (1 Peter 5:8-10)

5. "I AM AFRAID I WON'T BE FRUITFUL"

Your responsibility is not to be fruitful but to be faithful.

"And [Jesus] said, 'The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground. He sleeps and rises night and day, and the seed sprouts and grows; he knows not how. The earth produces by itself, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. But when the grain is ripe, at once he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come.'" (Mark 4:26-29)

"I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither he who plants nor he who

waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth." (1 Corinthians 3:6-7)

6. "THERE IS PLENTY TO DO HERE."

True, but there is a division of labor and God calls some to MISSIONS, not just evangelism. The difference is seen in Romans 15:19-24: "So that from Jerusalem and all the way around to Illyricum I [Paul] have fulfilled the ministry of the gospel of Christ; and thus I make it my ambition to preach the gospel, not where Christ has already been named. . . Now, since I no longer have any room for work in these regions . . . I hope to see you in passing as I go to Spain."

How could Paul say there was no room for work when there were millions in that region to be evangelized? Because evangelism is not missions.

7. "I am not married."

The best spouse is found on the path of obedience. "An excellent wife [or husband!] who can find? She [and he!] is far more precious than jewels" (Proverbs 31:10). The finding is exceedingly hard. It will happen on the road of obedience.

8. "I fear that when I get there it might turn out I made a mistake and will come home with shame."

Which is worse, shame for having endeavored to follow Christ in missions, or fear to venture? Shame before others for making a mistake will not hurt you; it will humble you and can make you more useful in a new situation. But fear will make you useless everywhere. Consider Ecclesiastes 11:4 and what it says about risk: "He who observes the wind will not sow, and he who regards the clouds will not reap." Meaning: without taking the risk of sowing when the seed might be blown away and reaping when the rain might ruin the harvest, you will starve.

a night of abandoned devotion

It was to a call for abandoned devotion that Christians across Cornell met on Friday, December 2, in Noyes Multipurpose Room—to abandon themselves and their world, to worship and pray as an abandoned (meaning uninhibited) people, and to obey God’s call to reach the forgotten people of this earth.

Khmer of Cambodia, Laos, Philippines, Thailand, Central/East Asia: Sri Lanka, Tibet, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Bangladesh, Dungan of Kyrgyzstan, Ghao-Xong Miao of China, India (Rajputs), Kazakhstan, Nepali of Bhutan, North Korea, Africa: Berber of North Africa, Fulani of Nigeria, Tunisian Arab, S. America: Venezuela, Middle East: Azerbaijan, Yemeni Arabs). God brought such confidence through His Holy Spirit, even putting it on the heart of one of the sisters to ask for healing upon

The Student Volunteer Movement 2, better known as SVM2, is a

mission movement whose vision is to see this generation of college students devote their entire lives to God, specifically by challenging them to take at least two years after graduating to proclaim the Gospel around the world. The Student Volunteer Movement originally referred to the uncommon outpouring of workers for missions between 1886 and 1940, during which 20,000 North American students personally committed themselves to world evangelization. It is in hopes of a second such movement that nights of “Abandoned Devotion” are occurring on campuses nation wide. These five-hour-long prayer gatherings are calls to pray, share, encourage, and challenge one another to urgently reach that day when “all nations might believe and obey him” (Romans 16:26).

Cornellians were blessed that night, during

which students from several fellowships shared short messages and challenges, though not to the express intent of mobilizing them on the two-year mission call. Instead, there were specific calls to first have personal repentance and both individual and corporate revival. God also put it on their hearts to pray against the barriers that keep Christian college graduates from going fearlessly to the mission field, to pray for His power, and for specific nations or people groups. (Southeast Asia: Sudanese, Madura, & Aceh of Indonesia,

those in need. Approximately five sets of singing praise interspersed the times of prayer and the message, and the night ended 40 minutes late.

Thankfully, many people stayed to help peel tape-outlines of continents off of the floor, load praise equipment into cars, and clear the room.

Some of the main themes of the night included: “Sacrifice isn’t just reasonable, it’s better.” “Go on missions’ = ‘know My love’: they

are the same thing!” “Be appalled, O heavens, at this, And shudder, be very desolate,” declares the LORD. “For My people have committed two evils: They have forsaken Me, The fountain of living waters, To hew for themselves cisterns, Broken cisterns That can hold no water.” Jeremiah 2:12-13 (NASB). “Sometimes we need to obey before we can see truth.” God can do amazing things, even in one night! The night of Abandoned Devotion was hopefully a starting point, not the end point, to our prayers. All of the forgotten and unreached are still waiting for God’s word.

CULTURAL RECIPES



aloo bonda

INGREDIENTS

- 2 or 3 medium potatoes (boiled and peeled and loosely mashed)
- 1/2 tsp. of cumin and mustard seeds each
- Fresh green chili chopped finely
- 1/2 tsp each ginger & garlic (finely chopped)
- 3/4th cup chopped onions
- 1/4 tsp turmeric powder
- 1/2 cup cilantro leaves (chopped)
- Salt to taste
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 1 1/2 cups besan /chickpea flour
- 1 tsp cayenne pepper
- 1/4 tsp baking Soda
- Oil for deep frying

INSTRUCTIONS

Heat about two table-spoons of oil. Add mustard seeds and when the seeds start to crackle, add the cumin seeds, green chili, salt, ginger and garlic. Fry for a few seconds and add onions and turmeric powder. When the onions start to turn brown add cilantro and lemon juice and the potatoes. Mix well and turn off the heat. Let this mixture cool. Shape into small balls.

Make a thick batter with Besan/Chickpea flour, salt, red chili powder, baking soda and water.

Heat the oil for 10 to 15 minutes on medium heat. When the oil is hot, Dip the potato balls into the batter and carefully drop in the oil. Turn it every four minutes and remove from oil when it turns golden brown.

Serve with tamarind or green chutney.



fried green tomatoes with shrimp remoulade

PART I

INGREDIENTS

- 4 green tomatoes
- 1-1/2 cups (1)
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon basil, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon oregano, crushed
- Salt, freshly ground black pepper and cayenne pepper
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 tsp of Tabasco Hot Sauce, to taste
- Shrimp Remoulade sauce
- Romaine lettuce, shredded
- 3 tablespoons chopped chives

INSTRUCTIONS

Heat the oil in a cast iron skillet until hot but not smoking, about 350°F. Slice the tomatoes about 3/8" thick and pat them dry with paper towels.

Season the flour with salt, pepper and cayenne. Add the Parmesan, oregano and basil to the bread crumbs and mix thoroughly.

Mix the milk, egg and water, and combine with a wire whisk to make an egg wash. Season the egg wash with salt, pepper and hot sauce.

Using the classic 3-step method, dredge the tomato slices in flour (tap excess from slices), then dip in the egg wash, then coat thoroughly with the bread crumbs.

Pan-fry the tomatoes, being careful not

to crowd the pan, until golden brown on each side (do in batches if necessary). Drain them well on several layers of paper towels. For each serving, place some Romaine lettuce on a salad plate, about 5 slices of tomato, then top with the shrimp remoulade. Garnish with chopped chives and serve immediately.

PART II

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 cups heavy-duty mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup Creole mustard
- 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp hot pepper sauce
- 1/2 cup finely diced green onions
- 1/4 cup finely diced celery
- 2 tbsp minced garlic
- 1/4 cup finely chopped parsley
- 1/2 tsp lemon juice
- Salt and cracked black pepper
- 5 dozen 21-25 count boiled shrimp, peeled and deveined

INSTRUCTIONS

In a mixing bowl, combine all of the above ingredients, whisking well to combine, and the seasonings. Once combined, cover and place in the refrigerator, preferably overnight. A minimum of 24 hours will be required for flavor to be developed. When ready, mix in the shrimp and adjust seasonings to your liking. Spoon on a leaf of lettuce, top with a generous amount of lettuce and a few slices of shrimp. Top with remoulade sauce and top with the tomato. Do not store shrimp in remoulade as they will lose their firm texture.

This has become a modern classic appetizer in New Orleans, having originated at Upperville Restaurant Uptown, then appeared at Uglesich's and spread to points beyond. It's simple, really – just adding one ingredient to the classic Shrimp Remoulade, but it makes a big difference. Cool salad, cool and tangy sauce and shrimp, over piping hot, crunchy fried green tomatoes. This is New Orleans with a touch of the Deep South and a hint of Creole-Italian, and it's a beautiful thing.
